

In May of 2015 me and my wife, the President of Fiysabiylillah Compassionate Aid Organization, visited Jordan to meet Fiysabiylillah's partners in Jordan who are currently managing the Syrian Widows and Orphans Sponsorship Program. We were also there to meet some of the widows and orphans themselves as well as to initiate our 2015 International Project by beginning distribution of the funds collected for them.



We first met with our partners, the Hemma Volunteer Group, led by Dr. Wessam, a Syrian who lectures at the University level in leadership skills. The group is made up of young Syrian brothers and sisters who are dedicated to assisting their displaced people. We were very pleased with their presentation as well as with the fact that no one in the group was being paid for their services; truly a volunteer group. In fact, instead of being paid, all the members were *donating* funds to pay the rent for their office space. This is quite similar to the set up of the Fiysabiylillah organization.

We outlined the Fiysabiylillah CAO process for helping the widows and orphans and for transferring the funds to the group and the level of accountability and control that was required. The process was agreed to after discussions and clarifications. We then agreed on a schedule for our stay in Amman, Jordan which was primarily focused on meeting the widows and orphans and making the first disbursement to each family, as well as setting up the system of verification and accountability. The following days were hectic with working days of 10 to 12 hours. We visited

49 widows and orphans who were spread out in various locations in and around Amman. After meeting and obtaining information on each of their situations, we gave the mothers the funds for two months with the promise that before Ramadan they would get an additional four months of assistance. They were all very humble, dignified and exceedingly appreciative and thankful. The children were given gifts and candies that were donated from families in Canada. This brought smiles to their innocent faces.

I was very pleased with our visit and wish we could do more to assist these helpless and unfortunate women and children transition to a better and fuller family life. Our help is just a start and will, InshaAllah, bring some relief and happiness to their situation. Sister Lamia Sami, Fiysabiylillah's project co-ordinator for this program was able to get significant help from families in Jordan who are now working with the Hemma group to administer the project. One family will ensure the proper disbursement of funds and will assist in delivering the assistance







to some families and another has agreed to provide office space to the Hemma Volunteer Group free of charge so that the volunteers do not have to fund this. I feel that our visit created a momentum for others in Jordan to come forward and help.

Like all trips we have made to help people abroad, Fiysabiylillah CAO does not pay for any cost associated with our visits. We are happy to pay for this from our personal funds. This has encouraged others, especially those living in Canada to come forward and volunteer some of their time and resources to assist people in their countries. May Allah SWT continue to help us to help others, InshaAllah.



After we left, shortly before Ramadhan a Celebration event was organized by Sister Lamia and the Hemma Volunteer Group. This event was attended by local Jordanian businessmen who all contributed to making the event a great success. The widows and orphans had a fun filled day packed with lots of laughter, smiles and joy. At this event, funds for four months (March to June 2015) were given to each family to make it easy for them in the month of Ramadhan. May Allah, the Almighty, accept our efforts and make it easy for us as we continue in His path. Ameen.

Syrian Resettlement Program

In 2014 Fiysabiylillah Compassionate Aid Organization began a project to support 150 displaced widows and orphans by providing shelter, food, clothing and education. Alhamdulillah, with generous contributions from the public and through coordination with local volunteers in Jordan, we were able to successfully complete this initiative. In May 2015, our President travelled to the region to meet with a few of the individuals supported by the project and was able to see for herself how a few dollars can mean the difference between desperation and hope for the most vulnerable people caught in a conflict.

Now that the Canadian government has opened its doors to 25,000 Syrian refugees, FCAO hopes to offer these widows and orphans in our program a better quality of life and the opportunity to resettle in Canada. Through personal contacts and coordination with our Jordanian partners, 10 families have expressed an overwhelming interest in sponsorship, hoping to flee their terrifying and uncertain situation and with the goal of rebuilding their lives here, in Canada. Our commitment is to sponsor these 10 families and assist them in resettling here in our local communities.

We have entered into an agreement with the Islamic Foundation of Toronto, a government recognized Sponsorship Agreement Holder, to begin the sponsorship process for the 10 families. As stipulated by government regulations, we need to raise \$300 000 before the application is completed and submitted for processing.

We are currently still accepting donations and at the time this article was written, the total amount collected was close to 80% of the amount needed, Alhamdulillah. Insha Allah we hope to be able to welcome these Syrian families to Canada sometime in 2016. Jazakallahul Khair to all who have generously donated to this worthy project and to all who have pledged their future support with resettlement needs of clothing, furniture and accommodations. May Almighty Allah bless us all and make us truly grateful for our lives here.

Light For Kidete Village Lineup for clean water A Fiysabiylillah C.A.O. International Project

The Fiysabiylillah Compassionate Aid Organization has lit up the Village of Kidete in Tanzania with solar-powered panels which provide light to parts of the village and a water well to quench the thirst of many of its people. It was a huge project for me and for the people of Kidete Village. Alhamdulillah, we are thankful for the donors and the contributions they made. My aim was to see the smiles on the faces of my people and to provide a safer life for women.

I was born in Kidete Village. I left when I was 6 years old because Kidete did not have any schools. My dad wanted us to study and have a better life. We used to visit Kidete during our holidays because my grandfather still lived there. I moved to Canada in 2001. Of course it was no bed of roses. I faced lots of obstacles along the way but I accepted those challenges and I had a strong will to do more to help myself, my four children and others who were in need. I have been with Fiysabiylillah C.A.O. since 2003 and I enjoy what I am doing.


The majority of people living in Kidete Village are old, poor, weak and uneducated. The land itself is very dry because there is constant drought. With so little rain the soil turns very thin and smooth, like clay. There is no direct access to water in the village. Women and young girls have to walk for miles to fetch a bucket of unhealthy, muddy water. The journey was dangerous because they could be stung by poisonous snakes, scorpions or raped. Alhamdulillah, now,

thanks to the new water well, the rate of these incidents has lessened. The villagers are thankful for clean, crystal clear, sweet water to drink and to fulfill their daily domestic needs.

Villagers once had no hope that they would see light in their village. Now, the solar-powered panels bring light and provide electricity to parts of Kidete.

For safety reasons, our pump, solar panels and water tank were installed near the Masjid with the permission of Imam Mzee Mwenda*. Since Kidete has no police post, the most secure place in the village was also the busiest place – the mosque! However, this does not limit accessability to the water simply to the Masjid or Muslims. The well is available for all in the village to use and benefit from.

We would like to give more to this village, such as shoes, books, blankets, clothes, medicine, food and funds to buy new windows, Insha Allah. With this new project in mind, I look hopefully towards the future for the people of Tanzania.

xtract water

The water springs from the ground. Alhamdulillah!







I am a native of Guyana, which was British Guiana until 1966 when we gained independence from British rule. It is a big country located in the South American Continent with Brazil to the south, The Atlantic Ocean to the north, Suriname on the East and Venezuela in the west. With a population of less than one million people, Guyana is unique in that it is the only English speaking country in the South American continent. Our first peoples are known as Amerindians and are comprised of members from the Arawak and Carib tribes. With the arrival of the British on their soil, the tribes were manipulated and deceived as the colonists bought them over with western goods such as tobacco and whisky, ultimately using this to gain control of their land. Today, the Amerindians are still present in Guyana but live in the remote areas of the Amazon Rainforest and the hinterland of Guyana. It would seem that the same situation that exists for the indigenous people in North America applies to their counterparts in South America as well.

With the British in control, the Christian religion was introduced to the Amerindians through various mission-aries. The new settlers were brought to work in the plantations. They arrived in what was then British Guiana from Africa, Portugal and India. As a result of this, I grew up in a multicultural environment where our neighbours were either of an African, Indian, Chinese, or Portuguese descent as well as from different religions such as Christianity, Hinduism or Islam.

The Muslim population is approximately 8%-10% of the Guyanese people and consists mainly of those of Indian descent. The Africans are now becoming more aware of the religion of Islam as they trace their roots back to the African continent and find Islam there as well. Quite a few of the Africans are seeking knowledge about the religion, embracing it, and reverting back to Islam from Christianity, Alhamdulillah.

Since the inception of Fiysabiylillah in 2001, I have been visiting Guyana regularly and never felt that there was a need to do a project to help the less fortunate. Alhamdulillah, Guyana is known as the "Land of many Waters" since there are trenches, rivers, lakes and the Atlantic Ocean from which the people derive lots of benefit and the soil is very rich for agriculture. I conclude that anyone who is willing to work can lead a simple and contented life.





Over the past 10 years I have noticed a marked deterioration in the social fabric of those living

in Guyana. Sadly, this behaviour is evident everywhere. The young people are growing up in a society where vulgarity is on the rise and morality is on the decline. This is a growing problem that needs to be addressed. Fiysabiylillah Compassionate Aid Organization has partnered with Guyana International Relief Organization to hopefully bring about some change for the betterment of society, Insha Allah.

Our first project beginning in March 2016 will be A Skills Training Program for low income women who are not academically inclined and can benefit from learning the



skills of baking and sewing. Islamic education emphasizing good manners and etiquette will be included in this program. The students will be made aware of the many ills of society, and our focus will be on equipping them to successfully navigate their environment by understanding and implementing the behaviour and code of conduct which Almighty Allah finds acceptable. Finding a quick fix to a problem is never the solution to the problem. One has to first understand what is good behaviour in the sight of Allah and the rewards from doing this, get to know about His Punishment when we choose the wrong way and also learn about His Mercy and Forgiveness when we make mistakes. If through this process and the Will and Mercy of Allah, we can save even one "drowning" person and get them back to the straight path, it will be well worth all of our time and effort.



Looking ahead to the future, we would like to set up a "Help Centre" where any female can come to get help if they find themselves in an abusive situation whether physically or sexually. There are also alarming cases where young women are finding themselves victims of extortion because of their financial situation and our centre would work to provide assistance to these women as well. Our focus would not be on "band aid solutions" but rather on the "causes" and the "effects" of each case and whether it matches the obedience or disobedience of God's laws. Educational literature pertaining to the awareness of Almighty God, connecting to Him through prayers, and pleasing Him through good moral conduct would be available for free distribution as part of our education and support system. InshaAllah, we hope to serve women of all walks of life whether they are rich, poor, Muslim, Christian, Hindu, black or brown. At this centre, focus will be on discussion, education and action. The Prophet Muhammad (may the Peace and Blessings of Almighty Allah be upon him) advised us, on seeing something that is wrong, fix it by good actions, if not then by good words and if not then by humble dua's. Rome was not built in a day; by making an effort, little by little with God's help we can change the moral fabric of my beloved homeland.

After seeing the devastation brought on by the severe floods of 2014 in Kashmir, India, I decided to help in whatever way was possible for me. So with the organizational support of Fiysabiylillah, I started a clothing drive in Canada and flew all the way to Kashmir along with a 40 foot container of slightly used clothes.

While distributing the garments, I interacted with village women who had lost almost everything and I was inspired with an idea founded on the principle of "teaching them how to fish instead of giving them fish to eat". Although there were lots of people and organizations trying to help in every aspect of life, I didn't see any one concerned about women who were not educated and who also had very little access to the knowledge of deen.

I started talking to many people about how to teach women some simple skills so they could earn a small income which would help them afford their basic needs while still allowing them to stay at home with their families. Alhamdulillah, we managed to open centres for these women where they are taught skills as well as Quranic teaching. Insha'Allah, the centres will also enable us to create opportunities for these women. For example, the Kashmir based organization, Sakhawat, is running 14 schools of their own and my idea is to link the women in our centres with these schools so they can make school uniforms for the students.

This project is on-going and requires support at every level. But it is a very rewarding project in the sense that these women get skills and work which enable them to help their families as well as empowering them with self-confidence.


I was born and raised in Kashmir and there is still a lot of illiteracy in the villages, especially among women. So being a "daughter from soil" it is overwhelmingly important to me to be able to initiate this project of helping my people and providing them with the means for betterment and hope, Alhamdulillah.

- Mid July US Director to present at Board Meeting in Canada on progress, challenges, etc.
- Representative to visit Tanzania/Zanzibar in September to report on collected money spent

Assalamu Alaikum. My name is Jawaad Abdullah Khan, and I am a volunteer for Fiysabiylillah CAO. I am going to talk to you about some of the fundraisers I have done with the help of my friends and family over the course of 2015.

In December 2014, some members and volunteers, including me, got together and decided that we wanted to fundraise for our Syrian Orphans and Widows project. Together we decided to have a hot chocolate stand at a public place. We hosted the hot chocolate stand at Masjid-E-Ayesha (Whitby), a local mosque that is close to Fiysabiylillah's Office.

In early January 2015, it was time to have the hot chocolate stand. My family and I baked treats and made hot chocolate to sell, and then we took everything over to the mosque. It was a very successful day for Fiysabiylillah. We raised \$316 and put this towards sponsoring a child through our Orphans and Widows project.

Later, we decided we wanted to sponsor another orphan, so we planned to have another stand. Obviously it was too warm for hot chocolate, so we decided to sell lemonade instead. We have been doing lemonade stands for the past 2 or 3 years, so it has become a tradition for us.

Soon after in July 2015, it was time to put our plan into action. A group of very generous sisters who were familiar with Fiysabiylillah helped bake treats to sell, and Fiysabiylillah volunteers made the lemonade. After Jummah Salat, we sold the treats to the brothers and sisters who attended the prayer. After, we counted up the money, and got a grand total of \$401. Alhamdulillah, we were



very pleased with our accomplishment. But we did not know that soon, our fundraising would be taken to greater heights...

In late 2015, after the Liberal government had established the Syrian Refugee Resettlement program for the 25,000 refugees, we decided to have a Bake Sale· Instead of limiting ourselves to the Muslim community, we decided to host it at Bellwood Public School (Whitby)·

The Bake Sale was held in the staff room. Student volunteers, teachers and Fiysabiylillah volunteers brought treats to sell. We sold everything that we started out with. At the end of the bake sale, we counted up the money. It amounted to \$410. This is the first time we have attempted to appeal to a non-muslim audience.

A couple of weeks later, after we received the cheque from the school, the President of Fiysabiylillah sent a thank you letter to the principal of Bellwood

Public School to thank them for their effort and support. We also sent candy to the students of Bellwood Public School who helped organize the bake sale:

TRACHING ISLAM THROUGH DRAMA
